## **Black Business Development**

IBE plays a critical role in supporting and fostering the growth of Black-owned businesses in Indianapolis and throughout the state. Despite Black-owned businesses making up only 3.3% of all employer businesses in the Indianapolis metro area in 2020, there was a remarkable 59% increase in Black-owned business openings by 2023. This surge is a testament to the resilience of Black entrepreneurs, who were able to adapt and grow despite the pandemic's challenges, maintaining their share of employees and revenue. However, many Black business owners still face significant obstacles, including limited funding, small staff sizes, and difficulty competing with larger, more established companies. As a result, Black business development and job creation remain key concerns for these entrepreneurs. To address these challenges, IBE has provided crucial resources, education, and visibility to uplift existing Black entrepreneurs and grow a pipeline of new ones. Despite these efforts, data from 2021 shows that Black business owners still represent a disproportionately small share of employer businesses compared to other racial groups, highlighting the need for continued support and targeted resources to ensure equitable opportunities for growth and success in the future.



## Black Business Training Institute

Year-round, 2024



IBE's Black Business Training Institute (BBTI) is a program designed to support and empower Black entrepreneurs by providing valuable resources, education, and mentorship. The institute focuses on strengthening business skills, enhancing access to capital, and fostering growth opportunities for Black-owned businesses, helping them thrive in a competitive market.

In 2024, IBE scaled the institute to work with small business owners in Fort Wayne, Elkhart, Mishawaka, and South Bend. As a result of these efforts, IBE provided business development training to 120 new business owners.

## Business Conference

June 24 - 25, 2024

IBE's Business Conference, presented by Delta Faucet, was held at the Indiana Convention Center, drawing 474 attendees for an impactful day of learning and networking. Expert presenters and panelists shared valuable insights on business opportunities and diversity initiatives across Central Indiana, as well as within universities, and state, and federal agencies.

Attendees gained actionable strategies for business growth, financial resource acquisition, and long-term sustainability through workshops and discussions led by industry experts and financial representatives. Topics covered included key opportunities such as the City of Indianapolis' Project Pipeline and upcoming 2025 Opportunities, as well as practical advice on navigating financial resources, accessing underutilized HUD zones, and creating a strong succession plan for future business continuity.

Other sessions addressed doing business with the state and capital readiness, equipping entrepreneurs with the tools and knowledge to take their businesses to the next level. This event empowered local Black entrepreneurs with the resources and connections necessary to grow, sustain, and diversify their businesses for longterm success. 474 attendees

## Youth Entrepreneur Series

Last year, the IBX Youth Entrepreneur Series (YES) introduced 81 middle and high school students to the basic concepts, activities and skills necessary for launching, leading, and growing a successful business. Workshops were designed to help participants develop comprehensive business plans and prepare pitches that were presented in competitions for prizes, including \$6,000, 4 Lenovo laptops, McDonald's gift cards, and a trip to Disney.

## **Education Conference**

IBE's Education Conference serves as a platform for educators to explore cutting-edge strategies and discover best practices for building a more equitable and impactful educational system. The conference offers a unique opportunity for educators to engage with thought leaders, share insights, and collaborate on innovative solutions that address the most pressing challenges in education today. Last year's keynote speakers were Awardwinning Journalist and Entrepreneur Soledad O'Brien and Dr. Kymyona Burk, the Senior Policy Fellow for Early Literacy at the Foundation for Excellence in Education. Their expertise and thought-provoking presentations inspired attendees to drive meaningful change in classrooms, policies, and communities, creating a lasting impact on the future of education. Professional development training was provided to 550 educators and administrators in Indiana to impact more than 30,000 youth across the state.

## Youth Leadership Summit presented by Purdue University

June 28 - 30, 2024

Over the course of three impactful days, 276 middle and high school students from across Indiana explored exciting career paths and college programs in the STEM fields. This year's Youth Leadership Summit (YLS) featured a diverse range of workshops designed to empower and prepare students for their future. Among the highlights was a Mental Health workshop, which helped teens understand the critical importance of selfcare, a "Giving Back to the Community" session that inspired students to engage in service, and a Financial Literacy workshop, presented by Old National Bank, that taught students how to build sound financial habits for their futures. Additionally, the FAFSA College Coin workshop provided students with the essential knowledge they need to navigate financial aid and plan for the costs of higher education. These workshops were designed not only to educate but to equip students with the tools and mindset necessary for success in both their personal and academic lives.

In 2024, 94 youth took part in Indiana Black Expo's Performing Arts Academy (PAA), where they received comprehensive training in dance, photography, music production, acting, and videography, alongside essential academic and social support. Through a partnership with the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, IBE provided students with the unique opportunity to gain hands-on experience and technical skills by shadowing professionals in the high-performance world of automotive racing. Throughout the year, students engaged in financial literacy workshops and collaborated on multimedia projects, expanding both their creative and practical skill sets. The program culminated in an unforgettable PAA Showcase, where students proudly displayed their talents in dance, photography, and videography, celebrating their growth and achievements. This holistic approach empowered students to thrive creatively, academically, and professionally, setting them on a path to future success.

## **Education Day**

Sept. 22, 2024

The Education Day College Fair offered 2,000 middle and high school students the chance to explore college admissions, scholarships, and campus life through direct interaction with representatives from approximately 25 colleges and universities, including traditional schools and HBCUs. Open to all students, the fair attracts thousands from Indiana and surrounding states, using the Circle City Classic® football game as a backdrop. The event also includes a celebratory Education Day Party, where students connect with educational service providers, learn about financial aid, and gain insight into the college admissions process.

#### Scholarships Awarded Fall, 2024

IBE awarded \$40,500 in scholarships to 32 exceptional young individuals from across Indiana, empowering them to pursue higher education and achieve their academic and professional goals. This investment in the next generation reflects IBE's commitment to fostering educational advancement and creating opportunities for youth to succeed in their future endeavors.


## **Summer Celebration**

June 20 - 30, 2024



Indiana Black Expo's flagship event, Summer Celebration, drew 94,298 attendees in June, making it the largest and most impactful gathering of its kind in the state. Summer Celebration featured a diverse range of activities, including the Exhibition Hall, Black & Minority Health Fair, Business Conference, Policy Summit, Music Heritage Festival, Education Conference, Black Film Festival, Cultural Arts Pavilion, Entertainment Stage, and more. Each component of the celebration was thoughtfully designed to foster a sense of belonging, elevate Black culture, and highlight the rich contributions of the Black community in Indiana. With its robust and rich programming, Summer Celebration remains a powerful platform for cultural expression, community engagement, and advocacy.

## **Cultural Arts Pavilion**

June 28-30, 2024

IBE's Cultural Arts Pavilion offers a unique showcase of five attractive events during Summer Celebration: 1) IBE Film Festival, a free one-day festival featuring inspirational independent filmmakers; 2) Cultural Arts Gallery, a unique exhibition that showcases the works of a collaboration of Indianapolis arts institutions; 3) Artists and Authors Market, a venue for emerging and professional fine artists and published authors to sell original works and meet with their audience; 4) Art Speaks CAFE', a dedicated space for artists with an interactive area for local authors and artists to share insight on their works; and 5) an Entertainment Stage where artists perform before thousands of attendees. In 2024, the Cultural Arts Pavilion included 15,585 attendees, 32 artists, 10 performances, and seven arts institutions.

## Circle City Classic<sup>®</sup>

The Circle City Classic® weekend celebrated historically Black colleges and universities. This cultural experience featured a captivating parade, Education Day, Talent Day, the thrilling HBCU football game, and the high-energy Battle of the Bands. Each element of the experience showcased the rich traditions, talent, and spirit of HBCUs, drawing 97,616 attendees and fostering a deep sense of pride and community.

In honor of the 40th Anniversary of the Circle City Classic®, IBE made a transformative investment of over \$1 million in two esteemed historically Black colleges and universities, North Carolina Central University and Norfolk State University. This strategic commitment reflects IBE's dedication to supporting and empowering HBCUs, fostering educational excellence, and creating lasting opportunities for students at these institutions.

## HEALTH & WELLBEING

IBE prioritizes health and wellness programs because of the significant disparities in health outcomes within the African American community. These disparities have long-lasting impacts on the well-being of individuals and families. IBE is committed to addressing these challenges by providing resources, education, and support to improve health outcomes and promote healthier lifestyles. The goal is to create a lasting impact that fosters healthier communities, improves access to care, and combats the systemic barriers that contribute to health inequities in the Black community.



## Black & Minority Health Fair

June 27 - 30, 2024

The Black & Minority Health Fair brought together healthcare professionals, organizations, and local service providers to offer free health screenings valued at \$3,500+ dollars, resources, and educational workshops. Approximately 14,600 attendees had the opportunity to receive vital health assessments, including blood pressure checks, diabetes screenings, and mental health consultations, all designed to empower individuals to take charge of their health. The fair also provides a platform for open dialogue about pressing health issues such as heart disease, hypertension, and access to quality care. Beyond physical health, the healthfair emphasizes mental wellness, preventive care, and overall community well-being.

# **Tobacco Prevention & Cessation**

Year-round, 2024

IBE's Tobacco Prevention and Cessation Initiative is a vital program aimed at reducing tobacco use and its harmful effects within the African American community. Last year, IBE reached **6,500 constituents** through its community outreach events throughout the state and presentations to middle and high school students in Indianapolis, Kokomo, Elkhart and South Bend.

The initiative raises awareness about the dangers of tobacco use, particularly smoking, and provides resources and support for individuals who wish to quit. Through this initiative, Indiana Black Expo aims to reduce tobacco-related diseases, including heart disease, stroke, and cancer, while advocating for healthier, tobacco-free communities.



## Cherish Your Mind Mental Health Initiative

June 27, 29; Sept. 22, 2024

Last year, IBE implemented its *Cherish Your Mind: Understanding the Importance of Brain Health* educational series to raise awareness and promote mental well-being, particularly within the Black community. This initiative was delivered during Summer Celebration and Circle City Classic<sup>®</sup>. The two-day educational series, in partnership with the Indiana State Department of Health, was designed to boost knowledge of and address the stigma about brain health.

Part one of the symposium took place on June 27 during the Black & Minority Health Fair where expert panelists discussed the importance of self-care and how to seek mental health support when needed for seniors and senior caregivers. Part two took place on June 29 before **180 attendees** in the 500 Ballroom of the Indiana Convention Center. Topics included the basics of brain health, lifestyle choices, cognitive decline, and dementia management, and navigating healthcare systems and resources. Ed Gordon, broadcaster and BET/CBS Special Correspondent hosted the event.

A Mental Health Symposium also occurred during Circle City Classic where **250 youth** attendees heard from panelists, including Metta World Peace and athletic professionals from local colleges. The series includes workshops, interactive sessions, and expert-led discussions that cover a wide range of topics, such as stress management, coping strategies, emotional intelligence, and the impact of trauma on brain development.



## CHAPTER PROGRAMMING & DEVELOPMENT

IBE operates 12 chapters across the state of Indiana, allowing the organization to more effectively serve local communities. These chapters act as key platforms for promoting IBE's message and advancing its mission as a nonprofit 501(c)(3) community service organization. Each chapter plays a crucial role in implementing IBE's statewide initiatives, hosting programs and events tailored to the unique needs of their communities. In April, IBE held its 30th Annual Statewide Conference in Fort Wayne, where 79 chapter leaders and members participated in training sessions. These sessions focused on program development, board governance, brand identity and protection, and financial wellness, equipping chapter leaders with the tools to drive meaningful change in their communities.


